fleabane It has a ring of bright yellow florets with a centre that looks like a lump of old gold, and the soft, woolly leaves clasp the stem. There are gleaming rivers of it now along damp ditches. It has an odd smell, reminiscent of carbolic soap, and it used to be hung up dry or burnt to drive fleas and flies out of the house. Another fleabane that is far less attractive is Canadian fleabane. This is very common in the autumn, growing in allotments, on railway lines, and alongside pavements. It is a tall plant with skimpy leaves that quickly turn yellow, and dull, tiny whitish flowers at the top that look more like seedheads. It is a native of North America, and there is an odd story that the first seeds to enter this country fell out of a stuffed bird that was brought here in the 17th century. It is now found all over the world.

Dinner tonight

Greengage vanilla clafoutis Serves 6 Prep: 20 min plus 15 min cooling Cook: 30 min

Ingredients: 25g soft butter; 400g ripe greengages; 300g crème fraiche or thick cream; ½ vanilla pod; 4 large, fresh eggs; 75g caster sugar plus 1 tbsp: 25g plain flour

Place cream and vanilla pod in a small saucepan and bring to boil. Remove from heat. Give pod a bash to release seeds. Stir, cover and leave for at least 15 mins. Crack eggs into a mixing bowl, add sugar and whisk for 2-3 mins until fluffy. Sift flour into the egg and whisk to make a smooth batter. Heat oven to 200F/gas mark 6. Chose a 11/2 litre gratin-style dish. Halve and stone greengages and place cut-side up in the dish. Discard vanilla pod and stir cream into eggs. Pour batter over the fruit. Cook on a middle shelf of the oven for 25-35 minutes until golden and the batter has risen over the greengages. It should feel soft and bouncy yet retain a wobble in the centre. Remove from oven. Serve warm with a dusting of caster sugar. Lindsey Bareham
